

Hatfield residents elect five Commissioners to four-year terms of office. Each Commissioner represents a geographical "Ward" of the township. The Commissioners are part time volunteers who make decisions on behalf of the 17,000+ residents in Hatfield Township. The Board of Commissioners meets twice a month to discuss and adopt policies for Hatfield's local government services. These policy decisions include items such as land development applications, road improvements, public safety matters, capital improvement projects, and open space preservation. While each year may bring different projects and policies, the overarching goal of the Board of Commissioners is always to promote the health, safety, and welfare of the community.

### Catherine (Cathy) Basilii



What is your job title, and how long have you worked for Hatfield?

Administrative Assistant to Building & Codes for roughly 12 years. I started part-time as a Receptionist in October 2010, then went full-time to my cur-

rent position.

What are some of your favorite things about working for Hatfield Township?

What is your job title, and how long have you worked for Hatfield?

What are some of your



# New Projects in Hatfield

### Welsh and Orvilla

Now that the Hatfield Commissioners have fixed the intersection at Cowpath and Orvilla, they have directed their focus on adding turn lanes to every movement at the Welsh and Orvilla intersection. Everyone reading this article has been stuck at this intersection, probably multiple times per week. Thanks to a grant from the state and a partnership with Towamencin Township, the preliminary design has been completed and the Township will soon seek funding for construction once it receives Penn-DOT's approval.




### Liberty Bell Trail

Improving walkability and connecting Hatfield to other communities has been a major priority of the Hatfield Commissioners for many years. Hatfield partnered with several neighboring towns to create a plan to build the long-discussed Liberty Bell Trail, loosely following the route of the defunct trolley line. Thanks to a grant for \$910,000, the Hatfield Commissioners will be able to build 1,500 feet of the trail connecting Orvilla Road to the Liberty Bell Trail in Hatfield Borough near Vine Street. This is a major first step in what will be a regionally significant recreation feature for the community.



# MURAL TO SHOWCASE THE DIVERSE HATFIELD COMMUNITY

I had a quick progression of ideas. This township has a wonderfully full schedule of great, fun, positive activities and events, and so many residents participate in them; I thought I could start there."

Like most communities in the United States, Hatfield Township has gone through its fair share of difficulties in the past three years. The Covid pandemic and social unrest took their toll on families and businesses throughout the township. However, rather than focusing on the negative effects - one Hatfield resident named Tina Sowicz saw an opportunity to bring a positive message of hope and togetherness to our community during this difficult time.

As a longtime Hatfield resident (since 1987), participation in community-focused activities and projects is nothing new to Tina. One of her favorite activities is walking her dogs on the trails. Years ago, she joined a community walking group led by the then Director of Parks and Recreation, Nancy Stock. After walking together and getting to know each other, Nancy asked Tina if she would volunteer in an upcoming race. At the time, Tina and her husband declined, agreeing that they were both too busy to par-

ticipate. However, after asking Nancy to tell her more about what was involved in volunteering - Tina became convinced that she and her husband should volunteer. They have been volunteering at the races ever since. That has sparked Tina to volunteer at other events, participate on special committees, and get involved in various township projects and Neighborhood Watch.

While spirits were low in the middle of the pandemic, Sowicz decided to get a message out to our community. She wanted to get behind a project that had never been done in the township, something that all residents could identify with and enjoy. But, most importantly, Tina wanted a message that had a positive meaning and outcome. So, while brainstorming ideas for the project, she considered the Hatfield Aquatic Center. The wall at the pool was in need of a repair, or at least a refresh - so it was the perfect place for a positive message in the form of a mural.

Tina mentioned, "I had a quick progression of ideas. This township has a wonderfully full schedule of great, fun, positive activities and events, and so many residents participate in them; I thought I could start there." Using a long section from a roll of paper towels, Tina sketched out her ideas. She included positive words, as well as images of people participating in activities that symbolized the township and its community. Tina used the township trails as her focal point; they served as a point of reference throughout her sketch, connecting township landmarks, the town seal, activities, and history.

After sketching out her ideas, Tina met with township manager Aaron Bibro in August of 2020. He was immediately on board with the project. Township Commissioner, Deb Zimmerman, joined their cause, and soon after, Tina presented the idea for the mural to the township commissioners. The commissioners approved the project unanimously, and they began the process of finding an artist, money for the project, and everything else they would need.

Aaron asked around to see if a grant or donation could fund the project so there would be no cost to township residents. North Penn Health Hospital and Education Authority Board generously donated all of the money needed for the mural. Once funding was in place, the process of finalizing plans and carefully selecting the artist began.

This mural has been a labor of love. After many discussions, edits, and emails, a final draft was chosen. Hours of work have gone into the

planning and completion of this mural project. Ms. Sowicz's dedication to the project has been the driving force, and the township staff and commissioners have fully supported her.

Hatfield Township Commissioner - Deb Zimmerman had this to say: "I want to thank Tina Sowicz for her vision and perseverance in seeing this mural to completion. It was a long process, but Tina never gave up on her passion to see the project through and made sure that the mural would be a good representation of all that is special about Hatfield. I was glad to be a part of helping to make the mural a reality and am very pleased with the final version. I believe it showcases Hatfield's sense of community and diversity really well. And I think once the residents see the wall, they will be pleased as well."

Tina's ultimate goal for the mural is that township residents will be able to identify with what they see – bringing the community together through a message of togetherness, positivity, respectfulness, safety, kindness towards one another, and enjoyment of what the community has to offer. Projects like this truly do take a team, and Tina is thankful to Aaron and Deb for their willingness to help her see this project through from start to finish.

This project is a great example of how one individual can make a difference in their community. With perseverance and teamwork, even dreams can become realities. The mural will be installed at the Hatfield Aquatic Center later this Fall.

# The Clemens Legacy

The History of Clemens Food Group Six Generations and Growing


It was in 1895 that a young, ambitious 16-year-old John C. Clemens started a small pork business on his family's farm in the Village of Mainland, Lower Salford Township. During the winter months (it was rare for pork products to be produced during warmer months due to rapid spoilage), John butchered one pig a week and took the fresh pork to a Philadelphia market in a horse-drawn wagon.

John married in 1900 and, in 1903, purchased a farm in Mainland for his growing family and business. Around 1923, Clemens incorporated the company under the name "Pleasant Valley Packing."

1929 started bright for John Clemens, with his business doing quite well. But when the stock market crashed in October 1929, the bank where Clemens kept his money closed, and he lost everything. Nevertheless, he managed to keep his business in operation until he retired in 1940 and sold his modern, progressive pork-packing plant to his sons, John S. Clemens and Abram Clemens.

Unfortunately, a fire in 1946 destroyed the Pleasant Valley Packing plant, essentially leaving the Clemens brothers broke. With help from their father, plans to rebuild were begun. However, World War II rationing made the steel needed to reconstruct the plant almost impossible to obtain. Then, the Clemens brothers heard that the nearby Hatfield Packing Company pork plant was experiencing financial trouble, so they approached the owners about purchasing the business. Soon an agreement was reached, and the Clemens' no longer needed to move forward with their plans to rebuild the Mainland plant.

Demand grew quickly for Hatfield pork products, and the Hatfield Packing Company grew steadily under Clemens' management. Since the Clemens' took over the business, there have been only a few years when the plant was not being expanded to meet the growing demand for their products.

In 1987, the company changed its name to Hatfield Quality Meats, to emphasize what the company stood for - Quality Meat products.

By early 2003, continued growth made additional plant expansion necessary. Unfortunately, they were running out of space to expand. The company presented a plan to Hatfield Township to relocate Funks Road to free up space for the construction of a two-story addition. The project was approved, and in 2005, a new "Clemens Road" was completed, and soon after, Funks Road was closed at Forty Foot

Road. By early 2009, the relocation of Funks Road was completed and Hatfield Quality Meats moved forward with its much-needed addition for warehousing and quick freezing operations. By August, the project was completed.

In 2005, the Clemens family formed the Clemens Food Group and, in 2015, broke ground for a new pork processing facility in Coldwater, Michigan. Two years later, the new plant opened, processing 11,000 hogs daily, doubling the company's pork processing capacity.

In Spring 2021, the Clemens Food Group broke ground for a new 300,000-square-foot building to serve as their smoked meats facility and to handle all of the company's smoked meats operations. The company celebrated the completion of the new plant with a grand opening in June 2022. The new plant is expected to create about 90 new jobs over the next 3 years.

Now, 127 years after 16-year-old John C. Clemens began his pork business butchering just one pig each week, the Clemens Food Group is one of the largest pork processors in the United States, with plants in Hatfield and Emmaus, PA, and one in and Coldwater, Mich. About 22,000 hogs are harvested daily to produce pork products sold under the Hatfield and Farm Promise brand names. The Hatfield plant, for many years, has been the largest employer in Hatfield Township and is now the 16th largest employer in all of Montgomery County. Clemens Food Group's operations include hog farming, logistical services, and transportation. As a manufacturer and supplier of over twelve hundred fresh and manufactured quality pork products, the Clemens Food Group has distribution across the U.S. and several international markets.

In February of 2021, construction along Clemens Road began on the Clemens Food Group - Hatfield North Expansion project. Adding the 307,000-square-foot smoked meats facility will allow the company to increase production, expand capabilities, and meet higher demand.

The new building is fitted with the most modern, highest quality equipment and systems sourced from around the world. At the same time, it incorporates best-in-class quality and food safety systems.

Team members are enjoying the inviting, comfortable space, which includes natural sunlight, new cafeterias, and team member facilities.

The new plant opened this summer and will be at full production capacity by the end of the year.

### Hatfield has a "Do Not Knock" list

When an individual or organization applies for a soliciting permit at the Police Department, they are given the latest copy of the 'Do Not Knock' list.

If a solicitor violates the no soliciting policy, all members of their group will have their permits revoked for an initial period of (30) days. Further violation will result in an extended revocation as well as any other penalties deemed appropriate under local and state law.

To put your address on the "Do Not Knock' list, you can complete the registration online (https://www.hatfield.org/Police/\_\_do\_not\_knock\_\_ registration) or in person at the Police Department.


Only street addresses will be collected and provided to the individuals applying for a soliciting permit.

A resident must reapply every three years to maintain their name on the list.



### New Ordinance and Sewer Requirement

Effective January 1, 2022, the seller of any property connected to the public sewer system is required to have a video inspection of their private sewer laterals by a master plumber or utility contractor to be reviewed and approved by the Hatfield Township Municipal Authority before any transaction of real estate can take place and before any Use and Occupancy permit can be issued.



Inspections must be performed within 1-year prior to the sale of the home or business, unless the existing lateral is entirely approved SDR pipe installed within the past five (5) years, and has been inspected and approved by the Hatfield Township Municipal Authority's Inspector.

PA Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has strongly encouraged Hatfield Township to prioritize reducing the amount of inflow and infiltration (I&I) in its public sanitary sewer system.

I&I is when stormwater and groundwater enter a wastewater system. This water, which ideally should drain into the ground or be routed to storm drains, can easily overload wastewater systems – causing sewage overflows to creeks, backups in basements, and impaired operations, among other challenges.
